The President-Elect: at the request of the President or during the President's absence or inability to act, shall perform the duties and exercise the functions of the President and when so acting shall have the powers of the President. The President-Elect shall act as Chair or Co-Chair of the Program and Professional Development Committee. They shall also have such other powers and perform such other duties as may be assigned by the Executive Board, prescribed by these Bylaws or MDMLG's parliamentary authority.




What is Graphic Medicine?

Broadly speaking, Graphic Medicine spans the genres of comics and healthcare. The books can be either fiction or non-fiction and the authorship often represents diverse perspectives and experiences. Many of the titles aim to put a human face to disease and healthcare complexities, while addressing knowledge gaps of traditional literature and book categories. Additionally, as a visual art medium, different styles appeal to an array of readers and literacy levels.


Selected titles include:

My Degeneration: a Journey through Parkinson's by Peter Dunlap-Shohl

Join a patient's journey through a diagnosis of Parkinson's disease at age 43. This book highlights an initial doctor's diagnosis, disease symptoms, drug side effects, relationship dynamics, and mental and physical changes of the disease. With humor and wit, the author chronicles life changes as the disease progresses and along the way educate patients, doctors, and family about clinical and personal side of Parkinson's.




Aliceheimer's : Alzheimer's Through the Looking Glass by Dana Wolrath



Walrath wrote this book to process her grief of her mother's failing mind and the artful illustrations apply well-thought-out humor when life's situations are not so humorous. Through short daily vignettes, this book captures a daughter's perspective through her mother's battle with dementia. Using themes of Lewis Carrol's classic, Alice's Adventures in Wonderland, the artwork and reflections demonstrate daily life of caring for a family member with Alzheimer's.

Graphic Public Health: a comics Anthology and Road Map by Meredith Li-Vollmer

Using various comic formats, this book demonstrates how comic strips can shed light and communicate complex public health issues. The book is divided into various health topics that impacts modern society, such as immunization promotion, emerging diseases, opioid addiction prevention, and even climate change. This is an informative primer that can get the reader started in public health advocacy.

MEDICINE IN MY VIDEO GAMES?

Video games have become a creative space for translating real-world scenarios into more manageable-and often more fun-situations. If you want to farm without having to get your hands dirty, there are now thousands of games out there that let you grow vegetables or raise livestock. Want to simulate driving a semi-truck? Want to know what it's like to be a goat or a goose and cause mayhem? Want to practice your speed-dating skills? There are simulations for all of that. Throw virtual reality into the mix, and there are ways to be immersed like never before.

However, because we are in the field of health sciences and librarianship, I wanted to highlight a few recent video games that might speak to our profession–some for laughs and others as genuine tools to teach medicine.

TWO POINT CAMPUS - MEDICAL SCHOOL / TWO POINT CAMPUS - HOSPITAL https://www.twopointstudios.com/

This duo of games by Two Point Studios takes players on the role of administrator/designer/ manager for an entire hospital or medical school campus. This is a mostly zany way to try your hand at running such an institution. The visuals are fairly simple, but things can get chaotic on screen as your campus expands and patients or students start to populate its corridors. These games are of limited practicality, but you never know when a decision you made in-game might be 100% applicable to a real-world situation. Similar games, *Hospital Tycoon* and *Project Hospital*, are different ways to engage in similar content.

TRAUMA CENTER

In the heyday of motion control and touch screen games, an anime game series was released called *Trauma Center* that saw players take up the virtual knife to perform complicates surgeries on animated patients. This series first debuted on Nintendo's handheld device, the DS, but saw iterations on the Wii with subsequent sequels on each platform.

While these games are in no way a suitable surgery simulator, they do offer a tactile experience that can loosely relate to what happens in the hospital setting. Unfortunately, getting access to the *Trauma Center* games in 2024 is a little trickier than some of the others in this list, most of which are readily available through various computer platforms.

BIOGUN

Admittedly, *BioGun* is the least useful game on this list. Players take on the role of a vaccine named Bek, who ventures into the body of a dog in order to save it from a deadly disease.

While inside, players find themselves suitably armed, and *BioGun* devolves into a game about shooting viruses, which, while fun, is probably not educational. That said, the visuals of the game beautifully render a subcellular view of the animal body.

MICROBE INVADER

Want to play a video game right now, on any old computer in any browser without issue? Microbe Invader might just be for you! *Microbe Invader* is a simulation game with a retro look that has players walking around a hospital, interacting with nurses and doctors, and eventually meeting patients. Players can see patient symptoms, order specific diagnostic tests, and then make a diagnosis that will be judged right or wrong on the spot.

This is a game with real information in it and players will likely walk away having learned something or cemented their existing knowledge. Unfortunately, the scope of this game is rather small. There are only about 5-6 diagnoses to make, but if you diagnose fast and accurately, you get more money!

HEART'S MEDICINE SERIES

For those looking for narrative to follow while they make decisions of life or death, developer GameHouse has created an entire series of games surrounding hospital life.



Heart's Medicine games have players taking on the role of Allison as she struggles with balancing her desire to become a surgeon whilst also finding love. Yes, this has your dating simulation and surgery simulation all rolled into one. The applicability of *Heart's Medicine* is, again, a little dubious, but so is popular television titan *Grey's Anatomy*, and that show has undoubtedly spawned its fair share of budding physicians!

VITAL SIGNS: EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT


To end the list with something useful, let me introduce you to *Vital Signs*, an actual Emergency Department simulation that is not only applicable to medical students and residents, but is absolutely free to play. *Vital Signs* puts you in the ER where you will make decisions about patients coming into the hospital, what prescriptions to give them, how to manage their care, and more. It comes with a plethora of cases to work through, and

while anyone can technically play the game, it's clear that many of the designs were intended for those in medical school.

MDMLG BOOK RECOMMENDATIONS: LEGACY: A BLACK PHYSICIAN RECKONS WITH RACISM IN MEDICINE



"Growing up in Brooklyn, New York, it never occurred to Uché Blackstock and her twin sister, Oni, that they would be anything but physicians. In the 1980s, their mother headed an organization of Black women physicians, and for years the girls watched these fiercely intelligent women in white coats tend to their patients and neighbors, host community health fairs, cure ills, and save lives.

What Dr. Uché Blackstock did not understand as a child-or learn about at Harvard Medical School, where she and her sister had followed in their mother's footsteps, making them the first Black mother-daughter legacies from the school-were the profound and longstanding systemic inequities that mean just 2 percent of all U.S. physicians today are Black women; the racist practices and policies that ensure Black Americans have far worse health outcomes than any other group in the country; and the flawed system that endangers the well-being of communities like theirs. As an ER physician, and

later as a professor in academic medicine, Dr. Blackstock became profoundly aware of the systemic barriers that Black patients and physicians continue to face.

Legacy is a journey through the critical intersection of racism and healthcare. At once a searing indictment of our healthcare system, a generational family memoir, and a call to action, Legacy is Dr. Blackstock's odyssey from child to medical student to practicing physician–to finally seizing her own power as a health equity advocate against the backdrop of the pandemic and the Black Lives Matter movement."

HISTORY OF MDMLG

The Metropolitan Detroit Medical Library Group (MDMLG) can trace its roots to the Biological Sciences Group established by the Michigan Chapter of the Special Libraries Association in 1946. It existed primarily as a social group until the mid-1950s when the members began to experiment with various projects. During the 1960s, several plans came into fruition including the production of a serial locator tool, the creation of a union catalog of monographs, and the establishment of an active interlibrary loan network. The group began the process of formal organization and chose its current name in 1970.
