

#### MHSLA PRE-CONFERENCE REPORT

On May 15, the Michigan Health Sciences Libraries Association (MHSLA) had its first in-person event since 2019. With 33 registrants representing academic and hospital libraries, the pre-conference was the kick-off event for the Michigan Academic Libraries Association (MiALA) Conference. Sponsored by MHSLA and the MiALA Health Sciences Interest Group and hosted by the WMed Library at the Western Michigan Homer Stryker MD School of Medicine in Kalamazoo, the conference theme was "Preparing for Take-off: Health Sciences Pre-Conference." We started the day with a lunch buffet of build-your-own sandwich, salads, soup, chips, desserts, and beverages. While we munched on our delicious lunch, Seth Pierce, the Michigan EBSCO regional sales manager, gave an informative presentation on the latest updates from EBSCO.

After a briskly-paced business meeting presided by MHSLA President Abe Wheeler, we settled in for the CE course: "AI, Higher Education and Medical Librarianship: Opportunities and Risks." The course was presented by Michael Flierl, from The Ohio State University Libraries. Michael's presentation was very informative with exercises for participants to experiment with various artificial intelligence (AI) platforms. We paired up with colleagues to test Google's Gemini AI platform, Claude from Anthropic, and Meta's Llama, among others. We composed a prompt asking what was essentially a PICO question, and discussed our various experiences. I personally experimented with Gemini, which I found useful for generating search terms. However, as I became more specific in my prompt specifying searching PubMed, Gemini suggested using MeSH headings that—when looked up in a MeSH search—didn't exist! We also discussed the ethical issues surrounding the use of AI by students and how the professional values of librarianship and our code of professional ethics can guide our discussion with students and peers around the use of AI. I personally had not experimented with AI much, and the course made AI seem less overwhelming and relatively easy to use. I'm more likely to use AI as a source for generating ideas, particularly if I'm stuck with writing, as I occasionally struggle to turn my vague ideas into concise language.

After the completion of the CE course, those that were interested could take a tour of the WMed Simulation Center. However, so many people were interested in the building as a whole, we were given the grand tour of the entire seven floors of the building. Some of us were even hardy (foolish) enough to hike the entire seven flights of stairs to the top. During the course of our tour we learned that the building was donated to the school by the great-grandson of W.E. Upjohn and was the site of the original research facility of The Upjohn Company (now Pfizer). It is an impressive facility, and if you missed the tour take a look at the virtual tour.

Registration was free for current MHSLA or MiALA members. Overall, the MHSLA pre-conference was a fabulous way to start the MiALA conference. Kudos to the conference planning committee and as both a MHSLA and MiALA member, I hope we can continue to partner with MiALA to offer such terrific programming at low to no cost in the future.

#### MIALA CONFERENCE REPORT

I attended my first Michigan Academic Library Association (MiALA) conference May 16 and 17 this year. The conference was preceded by the first in-person Michigan Health Sciences Libraries Association (MHSLA) business meeting and conference in five years. It was held at Western Michigan University in Kalamazoo. The conference brought nearly 200 academic and other librarians to the area for the keynote speaker Mychal Threets, as well as workshops, breakout sessions, and lightning round talks over the two days.

Mychal Threets is a homeschooled kid who spoke about his fondness of libraries growing up and turning his love of libraries into a profession. He discussed his career in the library field including becoming a Supervising Librarian. He also won the "I Love My Librarian Award" from the ALA in 2023. He told stories about the children he loved to interact with during his library jobs and even after hours when they would see him in the wild, like at the grocery store, out of his "Book house."

His mental health played a part in stepping down from a library position for now, but he is still finding joy in speaking about his library career and most importantly the people he has come across during his journey. Mychal is also in love with his cats—Machine Gun Kitty and Kissin Kat Barlow.

After the wonderful keynote speaker, there were breakout sessions that focused on a range of topics from A. I. tools, library instruction, textbook costs, and a Library of Things. I attended the Library of Things session. I know some public libraries have started these collections but was unaware that academic institutions have as well. The Library of Things could include anything the librarians deem that the students, faculty, or community could want to borrow. Some items that were available included a bird watching kit, a VR system, a weedwhacker, a grill, a digital camera, and headphones.

There were more breakout sessions and continuing education workshops after lunch that included metadata language, a review of undergraduate research, navigating remote relationships with employees, DEIA discussion, user experience, open access publishing, and post-Covid workplace models. I attended the user experience session, which detailed how a team from Michigan State University systematically went through and changed their website based on user feedback. The big take aways from that session are to not get too attached to anything and find a good way to incentivize your participants. There were even more sessions after all of these.

Day 2 had workshops and Lightning Rounds; I attended the Lightning Rounds. There were six talks on six different topics. We had some of our very own members presenting like Stephanie Swanberg from the Michigan School of Psychology presenting on "10 Tips for Supporting Systematic Review Research at Your Institution" and Lori Mills and Sheela John along with their colleague Maddy Wassick all from McLaren presented "Assessing the Search Skills of Incoming Residents: Challenges and Insights."

Lastly, was the MiALA business meeting with lunch. As is the case with all organizations many thanks were given for the committee that put the conference together as they should. This conference was put together well and well attended. No one asked where I was from, no one cared I knew many people from my time with MDMLG and MHSLA so I didn't feel out of place. All the sessions had something for me even as a hospital librarian. I hope that MHSLA and MiALA can work something out again next year.

#### WHAT ARE YOU READING?

A survey on summer reading picks was recently shared with MDMLG membership. Below are selected responses from the survey.

# What are you reading right now?

Mary Jo Durivage: A Little Life by Hanya Yanagihara, 2015. "Little Life follows four college classmatesbroke, adrift, and buoyed only by their friendship and ambition—as they move to New York in search of fame and fortune. While their relationships, which are tinged by addiction, success, and pride, deepen over the decades, the men are held together by their devotion to the brilliant, enigmatic Jude, a man scarred by an unspeakable childhood trauma. A hymn to brotherly bonds and a masterful depiction of love in the twenty-first century, Hanya Yanagihara's stunning novel is about the families we are born into, and those that we make for ourselves."

I've heard a lot about this book since it came out and am finally getting around to it. I am finding it is just my kind of book.

Alexia Estabrook: The Brutal Telling by Louise Penny (Chief Inspector Armand Gamache Volume 5)

Steven Moore: How Music Works by David Byrne, a 2012 collection of essays that mixes ethnomusicology and personal experiences into an exploration of the history of popular music.

# Have you read anything recently you'd like to recommend?

Mary Jo Durivage: Recently, I saw the play Photograph 51 about Rosalind Franklin and wanted to know more about Franklin who never received the recognition she was due for her part in identifying

the double helix structure of DNA. I read *The Secret of Life*: Rosalind Franklin, James Watson, Francis Crick, and the Discovery of the DNA's Double Helix by Howard Markel, 2021. I highly recommend this book by the Director of the Historical Center for the Health Sciences at the University of Michigan Medical School.

<u>Alexia Estabrook</u>: I recommend the <u>August Snow</u> series by Stephen Mack Jones. The series takes place in the metro Detroit area with many references to places we all know and have probably been to.

Steven Moore: I loved Charles Soule and Ryan Browne's Eight Billion Genies, a wildly fun fantasy graphic novel set in St. Clair Shores that follows a group of Michiganders as they try to survive the aftermath of a day where every human on Earth is given a genie. Soule fits the plot into an interesting structure where each issue takes



place over an increasingly larger period of time—from eight seconds to eight minutes to eight days, all the way up to eight centuries in the eighth issue. This spring Seth Rogen was hired to adapt the novel into a TV series for Amazon MGM Studios.

# Any other forms entertainment to suggest?

<u>Mary Jo Durivage</u>: I love movies and usually have a stack from the library on my TV cabinet. One I watched a while ago and highly recommend is <u>Mass</u> from 2021.

"Years after an unspeakable tragedy tore their lives apart, two sets of parents agree to talk privately in an attempt to move forward. The movie thoughtfully examines their journey of grief, anger and acceptance by coming face-to-face with the ones who have been left behind."

Martha Plimpton and Ann Dowd (one of my favorite actors) play the two mothers. I had recently seen the Metropolitan Opera's streaming of <u>Dead Man Walking</u> (which I was lucky enough to see in Detroit several years ago) and the movie allowed me to once again immerse myself in thinking about forgiveness, and how it can sometimes be so hard to forgive but that it really needs to be a part of living a loving and honest life.

<u>Alexia Estabrook</u>: If you like fiction podcasts I highly recommend *Midnight Burger*, *Achewillow*, and *World Gone Wrong*.

<u>Steven Moore</u>: If my wife is reading, movie buffs should check out <u>The Next Picture Show</u>, a podcast that discusses new movies and their spiritual ancestors. If my wife is not reading, movie buffs should still check out <u>The Next Picture Show</u>.

# What can't you recommend?

I do not often give up on a book but I no longer allow myself to feel bad about not finishing a book. The book I stopped reading is Donna Tartt's <u>The Little Friend</u>, which is her second novel. I really enjoyed <u>The Goldfinch</u> and moderately liked <u>The Secret History</u> so was prepared to really enjoy it. I just could not get into it.

#### **HISTORY OF MDMLG**

The Metropolitan Detroit Medical Library Group (MDMLG) can trace its roots to the Biological Sciences Group established by the Michigan Chapter of the Special Libraries Association in 1946. It existed primarily as a social group until the mid-1950s when the members began to experiment with various projects. During the 1960s, several plans came into fruition including the production of a serial locator tool, the creation of a union catalog of monographs, and the establishment of an active interlibrary loan network. The group began the process of formal organization and chose its current name in 1970.
